

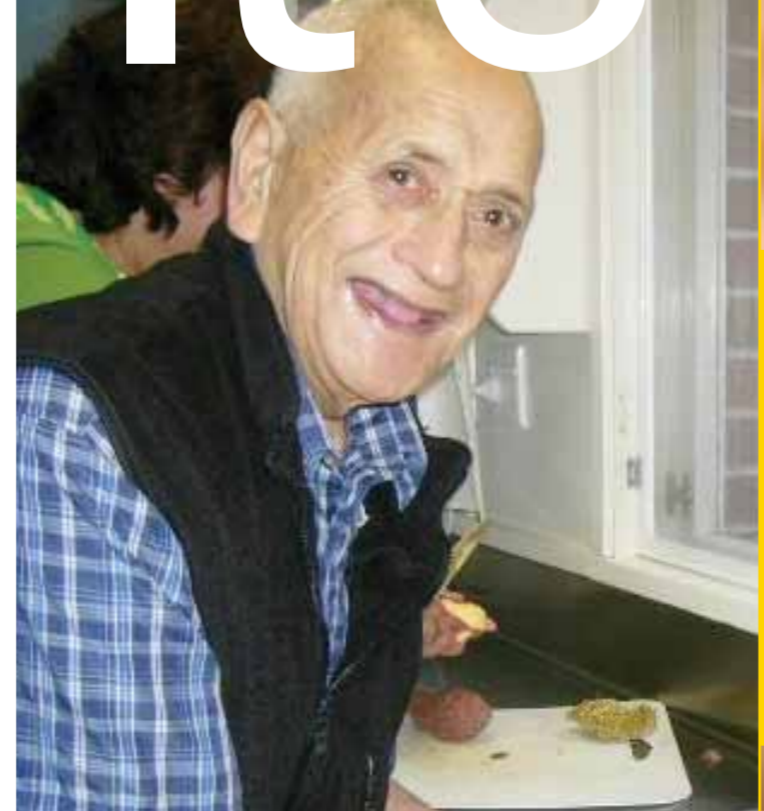

## From the leadership team

### It’s About People .....

“**Ka mate ka mate ka ora ka ora ...**“With this chant, the All Black Haka, reverberates around rugby pitches internationally. Its power is profound, and as ‘kiwis’ we feel a depth of connection – even if many of us don’t understand its full meaning. These words also provide guidance and insight into our mission and the very reason for the existence of Wesley Community Action. **‘Ka mate’** speaks of all that is counter to life in its fullness – and ultimately leads to death. **‘Ka ora’** speaks of all that enhances and sustains life in its fullness which in turn leads to a sense of well-being. Within Wesley acknowledging and appreciating **these two inter-related forces are essential to what we do.**

Throughout the last year we have continued to work with individuals who through their lives are caught in a dance of ‘ka mate’. For a wide range of inter-connected reasons (poverty, abuse, neglect ...) they haven’t received the necessary nourishment to sustain ‘ka ora’ or well-being, nor have they experienced life in its fullness. Trapped in the ka mate dance, they fail to see the ‘ka ora’ movement around them and thus often trigger a series of self reinforcing negative consequences. With these people Wesley seeks to be an expression of ‘Ka ora’. Wesley Community Action’s ethos is to try and provide or link the person with the nourishment that is essential for life. This nourishment can take many forms, from the tangible physical nourishment like food (through our foodbank), to providing respect and dignity (our staff interaction). **The overarching ingredient is reliable and unconditional love.** This way of working applies across our services to people of all ages. In the last year we continued to learn how this all-encompassing approach is a critical strength for Wesley.

This approach raises some big questions and challenges. **How does an organization like Wesley Community Acton give effect to reliable unconditional love?** In truth if we view ourselves solely from the perspective as one contained organization – we can’t. But when we appreciate that Wesley Community Action is only one small part of a much wider movement, a movement consisting of families / whanau, many networks, groups and people who understand ‘ka mate’ and who work to bring about ‘ka ora’ then, and only then, does our at times overwhelmingly big task appear achievable. At Wesley we are privileged to be a part of the Methodist Movement, and through that movement to the wider Christian and other religious communities. In all services and at all levels, Wesley staff work in partnerships with many groups and people – this approach is increasingly essential.

At Wesley we don’t only work with individuals. Many of the factors that contribute to ka mate forces are embedded in policies and ways people think about the world. At a societal level Wesley works to name and challenge those policies and trends that give effect to unhealthy environments. By engaging in policy forums and making submissions we work to expose and change life restricting ways.

We hope this annual report provides a taste of what Wesley has been up to in the last year. There are many exciting new initiatives underway and big challenges before us. What is critical however is that we remain clear and committed to our approach – **we value our relationships with people and work to give expression to ‘ka ora’ in all that we do.**

## Te Wana Quality Programme

This year saw Wesley Community Action complete the first stage of our quality assurance programme; Te Wana. 18 months of hard work by all community services staff in assessing ourselves and our services against a set of criteria culminated in a one-week visit by the Te Wana review team in August. This team spent the week reviewing the documentation, visiting the sites and interviewing clients, staff, governance and stakeholders for all our services. What was unique was that the interviews bought clients from all our centres together – young people, adolescents, older people and families. The reviewers commented on how all clients from all ages and walks of life felt that if Wesley staff said they would do something, they did it. Our commitment to a transparent and open relationship with clients was also obvious to clients.

The review report stated that Wesley has very strong and effective leadership and financial management, that our strengths based practice framework is woven through all service delivery and is recognised by clients, staff and stakeholders as key to our service delivery, and that team work is extremely strong at Wesley Community Action.

Areas for development include more staff involvement in planning at a strategic level and stronger participation by Tangata Whenua in management and governance. The wonderful thing about the Te Wana process was that we had already identified all the gaps ourselves. The review team will visit again in July 07 to assess us against filling these gaps, which will hopefully lead to full accreditation.

## Wesley Youth

“ “I do feel involved in things ‘cause Wesley’s a team organisation and include me with decision making and support me... I have a bond with my social worker and let her know how I am going... She’s a friend but also keeping it professionally based, but you can see that they really do care”. ”

Wesley youth services supports young people/rangatahi, their families/ whanau grow healthy relationships with self and others. We strive to provide unconditional care in safe learning environments.

### Residential Services – A stable home

After many years of ‘failed placements’ young people arrive in our care. Through stable supported living within the Wesley whanau they have time and a place to heal and grow. Wesley has two residential youth programmes – Te Whare Whakapakari and One to One Foster Care programme – both have professionally trained staff who are experienced in providing therapeutic support and unconditional care.

**In the past 12 months...**

- 23 young people were in our shared care, 9 moved on, of these
  - > 5 successfully reunited with whanau
  - > 1 into independent or supported living
  - > 3 into more secure care.

### Community Services – walking alongside young people

The two youth workers based in Wesley Porirua worked in local secondary schools and within the community to meet needs identified by the young people and community partners.

**In the past 12 months...**

- > 57 participated in a variety of school based programmes
- > 8 attended a self development camp where they learnt self confidence and communications skills
- > 91 received an individual programme tailored to assist them to achieve their specific goals and develop a relationship with positive role models
- > 170 attended a weekly recreation programme
- > SWIS (Social Worker In Schools) in Otaki
- > Social worker based in three primary schools in Otaki continued to support families and children in Otaki
- > 27 families and children received individual targeted support
- > 7 programmes were run in the schools addressing issues such as self-esteem, feeling good about yourself, anti-bullying and anger management
- > Mana Tane continued to go from strength to strength over the past year with 4 residential programmes run over the holidays with 14 young boys attending and learning Mo Rakau and Kapa Haka. These skills translated very clearly into self-discipline and respect with their whanau/families and peers and teachers. The Mana Tane children performed at Carols in the Park in Levin and were widely appreciated. A very proud moment for these children, the SWIS team from Te Runanga O Raukawa, WCA and the families/whanau of the participants.

### Evolve Partnership

Evolve is a health and social support centre by and for young people who live outside the mainstream. It’s a community initiative that takes an innovative approach to connecting young people with professional mental, physical and sexual health services in a relaxed ‘hang-out’ atmosphere. Wesley Community Action is delighted to participate in a three-way relationship with Evolve and the South Eastern City PHO; we provide the professional social work component of the Evolve services.

## Wesley Community Services

### WesleyCare Community Service – professional, community-based support for independent living

“ “It’s so lovely having regular contact and support. Before I was a bit unhappy and wasn’t around people. They’ve (WesleyCare team) given me a new lease on life... I feel quite strong and independent now and looking forward to life.” ”

WesleyCare Community Service works in partnership with older people, and people over 45 years with mental health needs, to help them maintain their independence and achieve a quality of life which reflects their own priorities and goals.

Our team of professionals utilise a multi-faceted holistic approach to achieve this, and in the process, prevent inappropriate admission to residential care. We provide case-management of the various services involved in the person’s life, along with advocacy, home visits, outings, transport, plus facilitation of family and community resources.

**In the past 12 months...**

- > 17 mental health consumers and 80 older people with complex health and social needs were supported and encouraged by our 4 Community Workers to set and meet personal goals relating to their health and wellbeing
- > The Tuesday Drop In Group continues to be a significant feature in the lives of a dozen older Wellingtonians who meet for conversation and company in our beautiful Community Room
- > The monthly Golden Gate Club remains a friendly luncheon club with outings and speakers for the 20 people who regularly attend
- > Into its fourth year, the 40/50 Club has provided 13 women (who are Mental Health service users,) a safe and supportive environment for community, peer support, outings and treats
- > The Men’s Group is a small group of older men who get together to laugh at old silent movies, go to exhibitions and generally put the world to right over a friendly cup of coffee
- > Our Volunteer Coordinator has recruited, trained and supervised up to 25 volunteers to visit, drive, offer Centre support at Newtown and keep our Care Ring (daily phone call) service running for up to 30 older people
- > WesleyCare has six highly sought after flats for older people in Newtown. There is very little social housing of this type available in Aotearoa New Zealand
- > We’ve continued our practice of having a Social Work student from Massey University on placement for 3 months.

### WesleyCare’s Community Team hosts or supports a number of Community initiatives:

- > Regular Citizens’s Advice bureau training
- > A South Indian Prayer Group
- > A group of older Cambodian women
- > A Somali Community Group

- > A very popular ‘English as a Second Language’ class for 12 older migrants or refugees
- > A low cost fortnightly podiatry service for up to 50 older people
- > Our Hutt Valley Community Worker has established an Elder Support Forum for peer support, networking and presentations for elder-care professionals. This has been modelled on the very successful monthly forum in Wellington
- > Our team also played a role in the initiation and the planning of a (multi agency) low cost specialist counselling service for older people in Wellington.

### Wesley Porirua – working alongside people for a positive future

“ “Theyre good people you know, really good people (Wesley Porirua team). First time – I came in for a food parcel, now we know them they’ve helped me and my rangatahi a lot, in a whole lot of ways. We’re better now ‘cause of what we’ve learnt and done with them. I can’t say enough good things about them and tell my friends to go if theyre in a bit of trouble”. ”

Wesley Porirua provides solutions not band-aids. We acknowledge the strengths of each individual and family as we partner with them to help create enduring change in their lives. Our aim is not to create dependency rather to lead people to independence. We believe people have the solutions to their own issues.

The Porirua team offer a comprehensive range of community based services for the people of Porirua. These include advocacy, counselling, a food bank and parenting services, social work services, youth work and individual mentoring.

Wesley Porirua believes in community capacity building; we work in collaboration with many local agencies in a wide variety of community driven initiatives.

**In the past 12 months...**

- > The Foodbank and Advocacy Service distributed 1585 food parcels to families impacted by poverty, encompassing 1236 and 1734 children

> The Community support social worker provided emotional and practical support for 38 families, partnering with them to find enduring solutions. He also ran a number of Parenting Courses

- > The Counselling Service provided free high quality long and short term counselling to 20 people.

Our youth workers and Social Worker in Schools worked alongside many young people in a range of settings. Please see Wesley Youth section for details.

### Wesley Counselling Services – low cost – high quality counselling

“ “Because it has been low cost I can afford to keep it up and it’s been life-changing ...I’ve been properly listened to and given good feedback.” ”

Wesley Counselling Service is an active partnership between Wesley Wellington Parish and Wesley Community Action. It provides free or low cost professional counselling for people who could not otherwise afford it. Wesley Wellington Parish donates administrative support and rooms; the counsellors donate their time and receive professional supervision and training. The service now includes a part time volunteer counsellor at Wesley Porirua and at the Hutt Union Health Service.

7 counsellors have supported the service over the past year, volunteering an average of 61 hours per month.

Over the year 95 people have received short and long term counselling.

- > 61% were unemployed
- > 45% had an annual income of under \$10,000, 34% had an annual income of \$10-\$20,000
- > 67% were female
- > 46% Pakeha, 24% Maori, 14% Pacific Island
- > Key issues that were addressed: depression, stress, grief and relationship issues.

## Wesleyhaven Village

“ “I love living here, there’s great contact and everyone is so nice, even the painters who were only here for a few months got involved in ‘village life’ and brought their Karaoke to Happy Hour. My independence seems to have been restored and I am very happy.” ”

WesleyCare Wesleyhaven Village helps people achieve and maintain a quality of life they control and enjoy. We take great care and pride in ensuring each person’s unique needs, tastes, safety and comfort are top priority.

Nestled in the hills of Naenae, this vibrant village boasts staff that give outstanding service in an environment that offers a continuum of care and living options situated in wonderful ever-changing gardens.

This year has seen much community support and major financial commitment by Wesley into the redevelopment and refurbishment of the village’s buildings.

**During the past 12 months...**

### Continuing Care hospital

- > Cared for 43 permanent residents with respect and dignity in the last phase of their lives
- > Plus 16 people with respite care over a number of admissions, many visiting on a regular basis.

### The Strand Rest home

- > Cared for 59 permanent residents with 24 hour medical care and a huge range of activities

- > Plus 24 people with respite care over a number of admissions.

### Deckston Rest home

- > Cared for 33 permanent residents with 24 hour medical care and a huge range of activities

- > Plus 17 people with respite care over a number of admissions.

## Supported independent living

36 people lived in units enjoying independence while being part of a community and were able to access health and recreational support.

# Volunteers

Volunteers are vital to our work. Over the past 12 months volunteers within Wesley Community Action have given approximately 7,000 hours of time. Their work includes...

- > 6 counsellors who donated their time to our counselling service
- > 20 who participated in the annual ‘Make a Connection’ street appeal.

### At Wesleyhaven Village

14 volunteers and 2 canine friends visited residents, provided entertainment, assisted with recreational activities, worked the shop, helped with outings and keeping the grounds and gardens beautiful.

### With the WesleyCare Community Service

33 volunteers assist by providing driving, visiting, hairdressing and library services, administrative support and the CareRing service which is made up entirely of volunteers.
